

CHAPTER 30

194TH SEPARATE ARMORED BRIGADE (STRAF/FORSCOM COMMAND)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

30-1. Deploys organic and/or separately deployable units by land, sea, and air, in support of contingency or reinforcement operations. Conducts combat, combat support, and combat services support missions. Receives combat, combat support, and combat services support units and deploy to conduct and sustain combat operations as a follow-on force. Provides support to the USAARMC and USAARMS.

CHAPTER 31A

U.S. ARMY INFORMATION SYSTEMS COMMAND

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31A. The commander (also serves as Director of Information Management, see Chapter 22) is responsible for planning, programming, operating, maintaining, and managing information management functions.

Through the ISC Resource Management/Plans Division, maintains/manages/provides and/or performs: the installation information management area accounts; management oversight for the contractor operating the Administrative Telephone System; maintains the installation ADPE Property Book; receives and distributes all Tier III equipment and supply items; updates Information Modernization Plan; reviews Major Construction Projects (MCA) for communication requirements; assigns and manages radio frequencies; approves ADPE purchases; assists installation customers with ADPE requirements; maintains ADPE via in-house repair or contract; and teaches introductory and operational courses on ADP.

Through the ISC Operations System Integration Division, maintains/manages/provides and/or performs: executive software, PROFS and network management for the installation IBM 4381 Mainframe Computer; serves as the Data Base Administrator for ISMs and provides computer programmer/analysis support for all ISM/ASIMS processing; operates the Telecommunications Center; High Frequency Radio (HF), and the Video Teleconference Center; operates the IBM 4381 Mainframe Computer for the installation; provides all hardcopy and microfiche reports from Mainframe Computer and ASIMS; manages the installation Official Mail, Correspondence, Copier Program, Publications, Records Holding Area; and Blank Forms; operates the Army Field Printing Plant and provides printing support to the installation and tenant activities.

CHAPTER 31B

U.S. ARMY MEDICAL DEPARTMENT ACTIVITY

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31B-1. The mission (also see Chapter 23) is to provide health services to authorized personnel within the Fort Knox Health Services Area, including: Inpatient and Outpatient Medical Care and treatment to active and retired military personnel, their family members and other personnel as authorized by Department of the Army; Veterinary Food Inspection, Animal Care and Zoonotic Control; Preventive Medicine Services; and Chemical Support Missions. The Fort Knox MEDDAC: provides medical support to the Chemical Accidents/Incidents for Lexington-Blue Grass Army Depot and the Newport Army Ammunition Plant; has responsibility for the special mission of the Camp Memorial Blood Center which collects, processes and distributes some 20,000 units of blood annually and supplies some 34 medical treatment facilities with blood products; operates an Optical Fabrication Lab that serves a five state area with single vision spectacles (this area encompasses the normal service area plus the state of Illinois and Tennessee with additional back up support provided to Fort Dix, New Jersey, and Fort McClellan, Alabama -- this activity produces approximately 8,000 glasses per month); provides medical equipment and supply support to designated U.S. Army Active and Reserve Component Units within the health services area of responsibility; accomplishes all pre-mobilization plans in accordance with paragraph 3c(8) through (15), as appropriate, of the Army Medical Department CONUS Base Mobilization Expansion Plan (U) (AMEDD-CBMEP); and serves as the Department of Defense (DOD) Alpha Test Site for the Composite Health Care System (CHCS) (an automated medical information system which provides: integrated support to the functional work centers of inpatient and outpatient care facilities; patient administration, appointments, and scheduling; nursing; laboratory; pharmacy; radiology; and clinical dietetics).

31B-2. Missions currently authorized at the Fort Knox MEDDAC are as follows: MEDICINE (Pulmonary Disease, Cardiology, Dermatology, Gastroenterology, Internal Medicine, Allergy, Aviation Medicine, Emergency Medicine, and Family Practice); SURGERY (Ophthalmology to include Laser, Intervertebral Disc Surgery, Urology, Anesthesiology, Otorhinolaryngology, General Surgery, Orthopedic Surgery, Hand Surgery, Speech Pathology, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Orthopedic Prosthetics, Optometry, Podiatry, Audiology, Maxillofacial, and Laser); PEDIATRICS (Pediatrics General, and Exceptional Family Member Program); OBSTETRICS/GYNECOLOGY (Obstetrics, Gynecology, Therapeutic Abortion Board, and Nurse Midwifery); RADIOLOGY (Diagnostic Radiology, Nuclear Medicine, and Health Physics); PATHOLOGY (Anatomical Pathology, Clinical Pathology, and Blood Donor Center); PSYCHIATRY & NEUROLOGY (Psychiatry (Adult & Adolescent), Electroneuromyography, Alcohol/Drug Detoxification, Electroencephalography and Adult Neurology, Clinic Psychology, and Social Work); PHYSICAL MEDICINE (Physical Therapy, Occupational, and Musculoskeletal Evaluation); PREVENTIVE MEDICINE (Preventive Medicine,

Occupational Medicine, Industrial Hygiene, and Health Risk Appraisal); OTHER SERVICES (Nuclear/Chemical Operations); and DIETARY COUNSELING.

31B-3. The Fort Knox MEDDAC has responsibility for mission performance at the following locations: U.S. Army Health Clinic, Lexington-Blue Grass Depot, Lexington, KY; U.S. Army Health Clinic, Richmond, KY; Hawley Army Community Hospital, Fort Benjamin Harrison, IN; U.S. Army Occupational Health Nursing Office, Jefferson Proving Ground, IN; U.S. Army Health Clinic, Selfridge ANG Base, MI; U.S. Army Occupational Health Clinic, U.S.A. TACOM, Warren, MI; Veterinary Activities, Selfridge ANG Base, MI; and Veterinary Activities, KI Sawyer Air Force Base, MI.

CHAPTER 31C

U.S. ARMY DENTAL ACTIVITY

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31C-1. The mission is to provide comprehensive treatment planning, definitive treatment, consultation services, and preventive dentistry programs to eligible beneficiaries.

31C-2. Missions currently authorized for the U.S. Army Dental Activity (also see Chapter 24) are as follows: Preventive Dentistry; Endodontics; Restoration Dentistry; Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery; Pedodontics; Removable Prosthodontics; Orthodontics; Periodontics; Fixed Prosthodontics; Oral Pathology; Oral Medicine; Orthodontic Residency; and General Dentistry Residency (2 yr).

CHAPTER 31D

U.S. ARMY READINESS GROUP KNOX

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31D-1. U.S. ARMY READINESS GROUP KNOX. Provides branch training and functional area technical advice and assistance continuously to Reserve Component (RC) units located within the Commonwealth of Kentucky to enhance training and operational readiness. On order (upon mobilization), reorganizes into Mobilization Assistance Team (MAT-Knox) to provide command and control, training and validation of RC units mobilizing at Mobilization Station (MS) Knox. Be prepared to coordinate military resources for use by civilian agencies in disaster control and counternarcotic operations.

CHAPTER 31E

U.S. ARMY SECOND REGION
U.S. ARMY ROTC CADET COMMAND

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31E-1. U.S. ARMY ROTC CADET COMMAND. ROTC recruits, selects, motivates, trains, retains, and commissions the future officer leadership of the U.S. Army, within the assigned geographical area of Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee, and West Virginia, in the numbers and disciplines required by Commander, U. S. Army ROTC Cadet Command; manages the congressionally mandated Junior ROTC and National Defense Cadet Corps program; and conducts the annual ROTC Camps.

CHAPTER 31F

DEFENSE COMMISSARY AGENCY, FORT KNOX

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31F-1. U.S. ARMY COMMISSARY. Orders, purchases, receives, accounts for, stores, prepares for sale, displays and sells food and household items to authorized individuals and organizations at prices consistent with regulations and policies, in support of the Fort Knox community.

CHAPTER 31G

U.S. ARMY TRIAL DEFENSE SERVICE (USATDS)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31G-1. U.S. ARMY TRIAL DEFENSE SERVICE (USATDS). USATDS is to provide specified defense counsel services for Army personnel, whenever required by law or regulation and authorized by TJAG or TJAG's designee. USATDS will also develop programs and policies to promote the effective and efficient use of defense counsel resources and enhance the professional qualifications of all personnel providing defense services.

CHAPTER 31H

U.S. ARMY TEST, MEASURING DIAGNOSTIC EQUIPMENT
SUPPORT GROUP CALIBRATION AND REPAIR CENTER (TMDE)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31H-1. U.S. ARMY TEST, MEASURING DIAGNOSTIC EQUIPMENT (TMDE) SUPPORT GROUP CALIBRATION AND REPAIR CENTER. Provides general purpose TMDE calibration and repair support within an assigned geographic area of responsibility. Directs internal support operations and ensures that responsive service is provided to all customer organizations. Maintains organic calibration measurement standards in an operating condition with accuracies traceable through the army calibration support system to the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

CHAPTER 31I

U.S. ARMY INTELLIGENCE AND SECURITY COMMAND
FORT KNOX RESIDENT OFFICE
902D MILITARY INTELLIGENCE GROUP

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31I-1. 902D MILITARY INTELLIGENCE GROUP. Conducts counterespionage investigations and operations; provides counterintelligence support to the U.S. Army at echelons above corps and designated Department of Defense activities within the state of Kentucky, (less the twenty one westernmost counties) or as directed by the Commander, 902d Military Intelligence Group. Specific capabilities include, but are not limited to, conduct of counter-espionage investigations and operations; vulnerability assessments and advice and assistance; operational coordination with federal, state and local investigative law enforcement and intelligence/security organizations; and the provision of general counterintelligence advice, assistance and validation services to supported commanders.

CHAPTER 31J

U.S. ARMY OPERATIONS TEST AND EVALUATION (OPTEC)
COORDINATION OFFICE (TECO)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31J-1. U.S. ARMY OPERATIONS TEST AND EVALUATION (OPTEC). OPTEC provides onsite coordination between OPTEC and the TRADOC proponent center. Provides operational Test and Evaluation (T&E) expertise to the TRADOC proponent activity. The TECO is responsible for continuous improvement of processes for the purpose of optimizing resources and improving products.

CHAPTER 31K

U.S. ARMY AUDIT AGENCY (USAAA)
FORT KNOX FIELD OFFICE

Section I. Responsibilities

31K-1. U.S. ARMY AUDIT AGENCY (USAAA). USAAA provides an independent and objective internal audit service to the Department of the Army, extending to all Army organizations and operations, including Army National Guard and Army Reserve activities and civil works programs, to determine if: financial statements present fairly the financial position and results of operations; resources are economically and efficiently acquired, protected, and used; and desired program results or benefits are achieved. The Fort Knox Field Office is part of the Central Region, located in St. Louis, Missouri.

CHAPTER 31L

U.S. MARINE CORPS
MARINE CORPS DETACHMENT

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31L-1. MARINE CORPS DETACHMENT. Conducts training for two Marine Corps entry-level, MOS-producing courses: M1A1 Basic Armor Crewman (MOS 1812) and M1A1 Tank Mechanic (MOS 2146). Additionally, supervises and coordinates training for Marine Corps students at other U.S. Army courses at Fort Knox, providing control, assistance and administrative support to all Marine Corps personnel.

CHAPTER 31M

THE DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY
UNITED STATES BULLION DEPOSITORY

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31M-1. U.S. MINT POLICE. The U.S. Mint Police protect the stored assets of the U.S. Treasury Department at Fort Knox.

CHAPTER 31N

U.S. ARMY RESEARCH INSTITUTE
ARMOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITY

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31N-1. U.S. ARMY RESEARCH INSTITUTE, ARMOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT (R&D) ACTIVITY. R&D conducts research and development focusing on the Close Combat (Heavy) force. Emphasis is placed on efforts to improve methodology basic to the derivation of Armor training and evaluation requirements and procedures, individual and collective training in Armor schools and operational units, and systems for integrating and managing Armor training. Performs field experiments utilizing Armor systems, to obtain results that can be generalized to similar systems (e.g., Field Artillery and Combat Engineers) in the other branches. The Boise element is responsible for identifying critical Reserve Component (RC) research issues and conducting RC training research.

CHAPTER 310

TRADOC MANAGEMENT ENGINEERING ACTIVITY (TRAMEA)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES •

310-1. TRADOC MANAGEMENT ENGINEERING ACTIVITY (TRAMEA). TRAMEA conducts Efficiency Reviews (ER); develops and maintains workload driven Manpower Staffing Standards (MS-3); validates Programs of Instruction (POI) and Course Administrative Data (CAD); and assists installation commanders as studies schedule permits.

CHAPTER 31P

43D ORDNANCE DETACHMENT (EOD)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31P-1. 43D ORDNANCE DETACHMENT (EOD). EOD provides Explosive Ordnance Disposal support to Fort Knox, KY and 95 counties in Kentucky. Included in this area, and of special concern, are the U.S. Bullion Depository, and the chemical munitions storage sites of Lexington-Bluegrass Army Depot (at Fort Knox and Richmond, KY, respectively). The unit also provides support to the U.S. Secret Service in the protection of VIPs when requested.

CHAPTER 31Q

121ST U.S. ARMY RESERVE COMMAND

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31Q-1. 8TH BN, 229TH AVIATION REGT (ATTACK). At M-Day (H-Hour), mobilize and deploy by land, sea, and air, and organize for combat. On order, conduct, sustain, and maintain attack helicopter operations as an integrated member of the Combined Arms Team. On order, conduct rear area operations. Peacetime: On order, conduct missions of national interest, i.e., counter-narcotics eradication, etc.

31Q-2. AVIATION SUPPORT FACILITY (ASF 73). Provides training, standardization, maintenance, supply, and administrative support to USAR units, especially during IDT, providing: technical expertise; publications; tools; test equipment; repair parts; and access to shop areas.

CHAPTER 31R

125TH U.S. ARMY RESERVE COMMAND (ARCOM)
EQUIPMENT CONCENTRATION SITE (ECS 63)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31R. To receive, store, maintain, and issue USAR equipment that is considered beyond the owning (Property Book) units capability to store and maintain at their home Reserve Centers or is not considered necessary for Inactive Duty Training (IDT) and has been authorized to be positioned in the ECS by Commander, 125th ARCOM, with the approval of the Commander, 2d U.S. Army; loan ECS positioned equipment to RC units and other approved agencies for authorized training, i.e. AT and MUTA, or return equipment to owning units upon mobilization; provide owning unit with current feeder material readiness data for unit status reporting under the provisions of AR 220-1 and material readiness reports under the provisions of AR 700-138; and provide internal safety for all equipment positioned in the ECS in accordance with AR 385-10 and AR 190-16.

CHAPTER 31S

3346TH U.S. ARMY DENTAL SERVICE DETACHMENT

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31S-1. 3346TH U.S. ARMY DENTAL SERVICE DETACHMENT. The Detachment provides limited clinical dental services one weekend per month at Nelson Dental Clinic under provision of Mutual Assistance Program (MAP) with the DENTAC, Fort Knox. Detachment's mission is to train and exist in a state of readiness for augmentation of CAPSTONE when directed by competent authority.

CHAPTER 31T

100TH DIVISION (TRAINING)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31T-1. 100TH DIVISION (TRAINING). To conduct Drill Sergeant School for the 100th Division and provide vehicle, supply and quality test support for units within the 100th Division, and to provide skill level 3 and 4 training for 19K and 19D soldiers within the 100th Division and 2nd U.S. Army.

CHAPTER 31U

125TH U.S. ARMY RESERVE COMMAND
COMPANY D, 19TH ENGINEERS

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31U. During peacetime, Co D is a Combat Engineer Company in training. During war they will roundout with the 19th Engineer Battalion.

CHAPTER 31V

U.S. AIR FORCE
OLAB, 4525TH COMBAT APPLICATIONS SQUADRON (TAC)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31V-1. OLAB, 4525TH COMBAT APPLICATIONS SQUADRON (TAC). TAC is responsible for the resident instruction of the U.S. Air Force doctrine, organization and concepts of operation to the U.S. Army Armor Center (USAARMC). Ensures service interoperability by providing the Center's Commanding General with the Tactical Air Force's position on the Joint Warfighting program.

CHAPTER 31W

U.S. AIR FORCE
DETACHMENT 3, 507TH INTERNAL AIR CONTROL (TAC) WING

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31W-1. DETACHMENT 3, 507TH INTERNAL AIR CONTROL (TAC) WING. The TAC Party is the forward operating element of the Tactical Air Control System responsible to plan, request, and control tactical close air support and combat support missions. Provides direct combat support to the 194th Armored Brigade (Separate) Fort Knox, KY, and advises the Brigade Commander and staff regarding all facets of tactical air operations and participates in local training exercises. Additionally, provides support to the U.S. Army Armor School, the U.S. Army Readiness and Mobilization Region VI, and Command Aviation.

CHAPTER 31X

U.S. AIR FORCE
DETACHMENT 5, 5TH WEATHER SQUADRON (AWS)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31X-1. DETACHMENT 5, 5TH WEATHER SQUADRON (AWS). Provides operational weather support to the Army's 194th Armored Brigade (SEPARATE), Armor Center and Armor School, and all assigned or attached units, both in garrison and in a tactical field environment. Trains and maintains readiness to deploy worldwide to support air and ground operations.

CHAPTER 31Z

U.S. ARMY MATERIEL COMMAND (AMC)
LOGISTICS ASSISTANCE OFFICE (LAO)

MISSION STATEMENT

Serves as the single point of contact between the logistics support community and field commanders in all matters of mutual interest; coordinates the use of all resources provided for the operation of the Logistics Assistance Program (LAP) to: Assist support units in the early detection of logistics related problems that affect unit and materiel readiness; Make logistical assessments in coordination with the supported commands to determine current status, historical trends, corrective and preventive measures for improving unit and command readiness; identification and correction of systemic problems; Furnish command information and assistance for force modernization, including displaced materiel; and Plan for LAP support of mobilization, hostilities, and other contingencies.

CHAPTER 31AA

KENTUCKY ARMY NATIONAL GUARD UNIT TRAINING EQUIPMENT SITE (UTES)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31AA-1. KENTUCKY ARMY NATIONAL GUARD UNIT TRAINING EQUIPMENT SITE (UTES). a. UTES is governed by the prescribed policies and operating procedures established by the Chief, National Guard Bureau and the Adjutant General (TAG) for Kentucky. The UTES are under the control and supervision of the Surface Maintenance Office (SMO).

b. UTES are established for prepositioning selected items of equipment for immediate availability in the event of mobilization and for providing assets to units for conducting Annual Training (AT) and/or Inactive Duty Training (IDT) during premobilization status.

c. The UTES is an activity that receipts for, accounts for, stores, maintains, secures, and issues equipment positioned therein and accomplishes actions required by KY ARNGR 750-2. It is managed by TAG KY and derives equipment from the Home Station Authorization of contributing units.

CHAPTER 31BB

GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRATION, REGION 4
KENTUCKY FLEET MANAGEMENT CENTER

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31BB-1. KENTUCKY FLEET MANAGEMENT CENTER. Provides quality vehicle support to Federal Agencies in a timely, cost effective manner.

CHAPTER 31CC

KENTUCKY ARMY NATIONAL GUARD, MILITARY ACADEMY

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31CC-1. KENTUCKY ARMY NATIONAL GUARD, MILITARY ACADEMY. To plan, prepare; and conduct training programs, which enable Kentucky Army National Guard personnel to meet minimum military education requirements and attain a high degree of combat readiness.

CHAPTER 31DD

PROGRAM EXECUTIVE OFFICE
ARMORED SYSTEMS MODERNIZATION LIAISON OFFICE (PEOASM)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31DD-1. ARMORED SYSTEMS MODERNIZATION LIAISON OFFICE (PEOASM). Provides contractor support for M1 Abrams for all of Fort Knox. Assists users in maintenance and logistical supplies for M1 Abrams. Provides liaison between PEOASM, offices in Warren, MI, and Fort Knox. Provides regional contractor support for M1 Abrams tank in CONUS, and performs fielding missions for various armor equipment at Fort Knox.

CHAPTER 31EE

U.S. NAVY RESERVES (SEABEES)
NAVAL MOBILE CONSTRUCTION BATTALION (NMCB) 20
DETACHMENT 0420

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31EE. The NMCB Detachment is assigned to the 20th Battalion, headquartered at Rickenbacker Air National Guard Base, Columbus, Ohio. Their mission is to train assigned personnel in all phases of construction: Building, Plumbing, Electricians, Welding, Equipment operators, and Mechanics. The Detachment assists Fort Knox to complete various self-help projects while training their personnel and staying proficient in engineer-type skills.

CHAPTER 31FF

DEFENSE INVESTIGATIVE SERVICE (DIS)

31FF-1. DEFENSE INVESTIGATIVE SERVICE (DIS). DIS is responsible for the administration of the Personnel Security Investigation Program for DOD components; DIS also conducts certain law enforcement investigations as directed by the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Policy. Additionally, DIS is responsible for the four major programs involving industrial security: the Defense Industrial Security Program; the Key Assets Protection Program; the DOD Program for Safeguarding Arms, Ammunition and Explosives in the custody of DOD contractors; and the Very High Speed Integrated Circuit Technology Program. This DIS Resident Agency currently covers 26 counties in Kentucky and eight counties in Indiana.

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES

31GG-1. FORT KNOX AREA OFFICE, CORPS OF ENGINEERS. Responsible for the construction management of the Military Construction program at Fort Knox. This work involves construction of new facilities supporting the installation's training mission, the Department of Defense School System, and the Community Support Branch (NAF). The Area Office also supports the DEH in contract management of the O & M construction program in rehabilitation and renovation of various buildings throughout the post, as well as major renovations in the Family Housing Areas.


CHAPTER 31HH

DEFENSE LOGISTICS AGENCY
DEFENSE REUTILIZATION AND MARKETING OFFICE (DRMO)

Section I. RESPONSIBILITIES.

31HH-1. DEFENSE LOGISTICS AGENCY, DEFENSE REUTILIZATION AND MARKETING OFFICE (DRMO). DRMO receives all excess and surplus property generated by Department of Defense and Coast Guard activities in the assigned geographical areas of Kentucky, Indiana, and Tennessee. Provides for screening of property to other DOD and Federal Agencies for possible redistribution/reutilization, and for donation of remaining property to State Agencies and eligible national organizations, and sells remaining property through local auction or national sealed bid sales. Receives, segregates, and stores recyclable (scrap) materials; contracts for the sale and removal of recyclable materials to commercial firms; and reimburses 100 percent of proceeds to originating activity. Administers contracts for the removal of RCRA regulated and nonregulated Hazardous Waste and monitors the performance of the contractor and contractor personnel. Receives and stores Hazardous Waste in Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved permitted storage facility. Assists customers in the completion of required documents to turn in Hazardous Waste. Receives and recovers Precious Metals for eventual refining by commercial contract. Performs, when required, demilitarization (destruction) of munitions and strategic list items, such as arms and tactical equipment.
